Unicorn Bones



Ingredients

1/4 cup of homemade (or ready-made unsalted unseasoned) chicken stock (see tips below)

1/4 cup low fat milk powder

1 egg

1 cup rice flour

For tinting-turmeric powder (yellow), beetroot powder (pink), wheatgrass powder (green), blue food coloring

Directions

Preheat oven to 350° and mix chicken stock, milk powder, egg and rice flour (add rice flour in slow increments and make sure not to let the mix get too dry). Once mixed, divide dough into smaller portions for tinting. Tint each section by adding the appropriate powder or coloring of your preference. Separate the dough into small pieces either by ripping and scattering them by hand or rolling each color flat and cutting them. Gather pieces of each color and squeeze them into a loose ball. Roll out each ball and use your favorite cookie cutter to cut into shapes. Bake for 12 minutes and let cool before serving. Thanks to
